#### Views from the Head of School, BILL KRALOVEC

As the school year comes to a close, it is time to say farewell to families that are leaving our community. It is also a time to honor departing faculty. A recent study of the East Asia Region Council of Schools (EARCOS) showed a yearly retention rate across international schools in the region of 68% of the faculty. That means on a yearly basis, about 1/3 of teachers change international schools. The past 8 years, OIS has a retention rate of 86%, with an average of 5 full-time teachers leaving. Retention rates are determined by push and pull factors which include quality of life in a country or city, salary and benefits, the effectiveness of teaching student interaction, and so on. OIS and environment. Japan score high on many of these factors, hence the high retention rates. The following teachers will be leaving at the end of this year:



Melissa Lamug is our K-12 counselor and in the last 5 years has helped our graduates get into many excellent universities. She is also proud of her work counseling individual students and families to support them in coping life. She will be moving to Singapore and

be joining the college admissions team of the Stamford American International School.



Michael Routh has taught physical education at SOIS for the past six years. He has been instrumental in the PE program in becoming a model of IB Middle Years Programme (MYP) best practices. He also coached basketball and volleyball and his teams won

numerous championships. Mr. Routh is moving on to Wellington College, a new school in Hangzhou, China.



Andrew Dieterly taught in the visual arts department for 4 years. His quiet demeanor relaxed students to allow them to find their creative juices and produce beautiful works of art. Andrew will be devoting more of his time to his professional artwork.

Two teachers who have been with us a short time will also be moving on. Karen Zurich arrived in February to take over for Ms. Vimont. She has really made a difference and her third grade students have not missed a beat. She will be teaching full-time at the Osaka YMCA International School. On behalf of the students at OIS, thanks for making a difference and best wishes for your next adventure.

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
#### from the MS/HS Principal, KURT MECKLEM




# Extended Essay Cafe
