#### Views from the Head of School, BILL KRALOVEC

All OIS parents and teachers with children enrolled in school are automatically members of the Parent Teacher Association (PTA). The role of the PTA is to promote the welfare of OIS students and encourage parent and community participation in the life of the school. The PTA meetings on the second Wednesday of every month at 9:00 AM.

All OIS families are obligated to contribute to the PTA by serving at least one year as a representative. For each grade level, there are two representatives, one contributes to PTA meetings and the other representative serves on the International Fair committee. This system of requiring participation from all families is unusual for international schools and in my opinion, makes the OIS PTA special. In most international schools, participation is voluntary and the bulk of initiatives falls upon the shoulders of a few regular volunteers.

The year-long term is the calendar year, not the academic year. New representatives start in December and end in November. In the December meeting, representatives volunteer for leadership positions on the PTA. We have been blessed by having thoughtful, caring and hard-working parents who have led the PTA through the years. It has resulted in a positive organization that

puts the needs of the entire student body before their personal needs or wishes.

Every PTA has its distinct characteristics, making their mark in improving our community. The 2018 PTA worked tirelessly to improve the cafeteria and the nutrition of the food service for our community. All of the PTA cohorts in my time at the school have contributed to the life of the school by hosting events like the Welcome and Farewell parties, Teacher Appreciation Days and funding visiting author visits and our Learning Spaces projects.

The OIS PTA also reaches out to the Senri International School Parent Association to promote our Two Schools Together programs and events. The annual International Fair in November is the culmination of this partnership.

The 2019 version of the PTA has been spending a lot of time at school planning and meeting with community members. We are looking forward to their contributions to our community.

# from the ES Principal, CAROLYNE MARSHALL

Part of our mission statement describes how we aim to help our students develop as "creative individuals." This is practised in a range of ways throughout the elementary school stretching far beyond the art class.

On the last day of the winter trimester we held our third annual Creativity Day. With the rest of the school out on various trips and camps we were able to use areas of the campus not usually available. Preparation for this day of inventive expression began a month in advance and was firmly focused on the interests of the students. This is an important component of the new enhanced PYP we are now implementing. Students need to have a voice in their learning and be an integral part of the planning process. Thus an assembly time was spent brainstorming activities with multi-age groups of students so they could tell the teachers what they wanted to try out. These choices were then organized into different activities. There was swimming, science experiments, cooking, construction, Canadian kickball, golf and painting. The students were then able to select which of these activities they wanted to try during the special day. Meanwhile teachers organized resources.

In mixed age groups all the PYP students enjoyed exploring new skills. They were able to share their thinking and extend their communication skills whilst making new friends. In many of the activities students could create a group piece such as painting a mural or building the tallest tower using only recycled paper and a little tape. They practised careful measuring to make delicious chocolate balls and to conduct interesting experiments. Swimming was enjoyed because students could be active and cool down. They liked learning the rules of Canadian kickball which they could compare to other games they knew. Designing and building a golf course really enabled the students to use their creativity. Some holes were very complex. One student told me he'd like to do this again but would use natural objects found around the campus. Such inventive thinking shows how this day has sparked interest and is expanding thinking into other possibilities. Such flexible thinking skills are definitely what we aim to develop in all PYP students.

This week we are applying our creativity to the cause of safeguarding our planet. The students have used their voice and asked to plant up seeds and plants to help replace those that humans destroy daily. The Actioneers have organized a nature hunt in the park to encourage

students to notice the diversity of flora and fauna around them as they construct a natural collage.

Next week will be an ideal time for families to be creative together. Your children can show you some of the skills they have learned at school. Let them teach you and be prepared to get messy together! I hope you will make the most of the holiday so it is a golden week of creative memories with your family.



# Grade 11 Service Trip to Cebu



Below is an edited excerpt of Tasuke Azuma's and Kennan Eldridge's article on the grade 11 Service Trip to Cebu, Philippines. Be sure to check out the next Tango for the full article.

Cebu is known for its beautiful turquoise seas and skies, making it a perfect travel destination for holiday vacation. Recently, the number of Japanese visitors to islands of Cebu has steadily been increasing. Similar to previous years, the grade eleven students went to islands of Cebu for our CAS service trip, unaware of the challenges as well as excitement it has brought about.

After settling in and spending a day doing tourist activities, we began the service portion of the trip. We started at Cebu International School, then split into three groups each working on making Onigiri at CIS, volunteering at Island Rescue Operation (IRO), and interacting with students in Pit-os National High School.

The first group managed to make around one hundred Onigiri to donate. The second group at IRO, an animal welfare organization was able to interact with the incredible staff and many of the animals taken care of at the shelter. The third group played basketball, Japanese games, and games that Pit-os students came up with. We also donated books from SOIS library.

After having a lunch at CIS, we went to visit the Mandaue Umapad community. We first donated rice, food and beverages from Jollybee, a fast food store of Philippines which we bought on the way, and onigiri we made. Although we could only donate a one-time material, I felt that this served to start a meaningful communication with individuals of the community.

The next two days we went to Caohagan Island, where we volunteered at a school. We engaged with children through playing games such as musical chairs, capture the flag, and breaking a piñata.











We made Japanese style chicken curry over an open fire that we served to the children and we helped build the foundation for a new classroom. After all of our work we had a day to relax before flying back to Osaka.

Looking back at how we made contributions to the communities in Mandaue and Caohagan, I personally think it was a great plan. By returning to some of the same communities, we are paving the way for a more sustainable and continuous project rather than simply giving temporary aid. But, I believe that this trip also has room for improvements. When we distributed foods at Mandaue Umapad community on day three, rice balls were not so popular, especially amongst young children. This made me realise that there is still a need to work on identifying community needs, so that we do not end up giving unwanted donations. We could have altered slightly to make it meet the needs of theirs. Another point to note is to focus on contributions that only high school students can make, or are good at. Working on the construction site probably did help the community, and so did the curry cooking, but any adults on the island could have done the same. To maximise the quality of contribution, it is important to keep the content of service within a high school students' realm.

At one point in the trip, Mr Mecklem asked us whether this kind of project is worthwhile. We could simply donate the fee associated with this trip to the communities we visited. From a pragmatic and materialistic perspective, this could be considered as the definite solution. As Nanami Hasegawa said, the trip could be a meaningful investment if we are able to take lessons from the experience of this trip, and connect it to our future actions. In this way, the grade trip would serve a model of more than just a tourism.

# **Tokyo Emergency LifeLine (TELL)**

The Tokyo Emergency LifeLine (<a href="https://tellip.com/">https://tellip.com/</a>) for 45 years has been providing important connections and support to English-speaking people across Japan. They save lives through mental health support. TELL Japan is most known for the LifeLine (03-5774-0992) that takes phone calls from people that are lonely, need someone talk to and perhaps, even contemplating suicide. Trained operators are available every day from 9:00am to 11:00pm. TELL also operates an online chat from 10:30pm to 2:00am. Most of their calls are from Japanese nationals, but they also help the foreign community in Japan.

Despite the Tokyo in the name, TELL has a national presence. The Kansai Outreach Coordinator, Ms. Min Ku has visited OIS several times to talk with faculty about the services they provide. They are always looking for Volunteer Coordinators and LifeLine operators. Besides the LifeLine, TELL provides references for counselors, therapists, psychologists and other well-being specialists. They also hold outreach events like school presentations, informal conversations, etc.

We invited David France, a Body Movement Therapist, one of TELL's team of health professionals to work with our faculty during our April in-service. THe OIS faculty learned about the connection between mind and body and the impact of yoga and body movement to help psychological health. David is one of the instructors at Freestyle Move Dance Studio. We all felt invigorated and thought about how we can incorporate movement and body awareness for our students to improve their thinking.
