

This is an unusual January for me as most years would find me recruiting teachers. The International Baccalaureate is committed to supporting multilingualism as fundamental to increasing intercultural understanding and international-mindedness. With this in mind, we try to support a range of languages here at the school. Not only English and Japanese, but other mother tongue languages when possible. Several of our students are studying French language with Mr. Pierre Turlur. I would like to congratulate OIS high school students Sola Lutringer and Manon Raby-Natsuaki who passed the B1 and B2 levels respectively of the DELF/DALF exams. These exams are part of the Common European Framework of References for Languages and are at an advanced intermediate level of a foreign language learner. The exams are administered by the Institut Francais. We hope to expand this program for our other languages in Spanish, Mandarin and Japanese, to go along with English proficiency exams like the EIKEN and TOEFL.

I would like to invite all parents to my Head of School symposium on the International Baccalaureate concepts of Approaches to Teaching and Learning (ATL) and how parents can help their children learn more in school. The big idea behind ATL is students using the power of the mind and ways of thinking and applying them to new situations to solve problems. This is opposite to the more traditional absorption and regurgitation of facts that is practiced in many schools. They are the strategies, skills and attitudes that permeate through the IB. It will take place at 7:00 PM on Tuesday January 19 in the third floor conference room.

Finally, I would like to welcome the Attwood-Konishi family to OIS. They come to us from Kent, UK and Sana will be in grade 7 and Kia in grade 3. The current OIS enrollment is 273 students with 34 different nationalities represented in our student body.

from the desk of the elementary principal, CAROLYNE MARSHALL

A new calendar year has begun and the first month January is named after the Roman god Janus. He is often depicted having two heads, one which looks forwards and the other looking backwards. This reminds us that a new year is time for reflection. PYP students learn to practice this skill as they engage in the programme throughout each year.

When our students begin an inquiry in maths, language or one of their transdisciplinary units, they brainstorm what questions they want to find answers to. This is often shown in a class display that you can see in many of our classrooms as it demonstrates the goals of an inquiry. Then the students look forward and plan which resources will help them find answers. Guided by their teachers, they will explore as wide a range of sources as time allows. Working out together the route they need to take enables the students become more independent in their learning.

When a unit is concluded usually after about six weeks of investigation, the students will look back over their learning journey and will reflect on the growth in their understanding. This can be in the form of a discussion in the class circle or as individual written reflections. The students will also assess the usefulness of the resources they found. This review is also documented and discussed by the teachers with me as we complete each PYP unit planner. A clear record is thus maintained which informs planning for the following year. It is also noticeable that the students can recall and utilize their previous learning from prior years. I saw this recently whilst working with grade 5 to create a debate about the role of online learning. The students remembered how they organized their ideas in grade 4 on a different theme and were able to use these skills again.

The PYP is structured to enable students to reuse and extend the skills they learn. We achieve this by looking forwards and backwards but not just once a year in January. Reflection is a vital skill that is practiced daily by our students. I encourage you to ask your child about what they have learned and how they plan to learn in the future. Sharing in the journey together will be fascinating.





SURVIVING DISASTER! by Lora Vimont, G4 teacher

Imagine if we were at school and a powerful earthquake happened. What kinds of safety procedures should we follow? What emergency materials should we have on hand to help us survive? Is our building equipped to withstand a powerful tremor?



In our unit on How the World Works, the Grade 4 class has been investigating the science behind plate tectonics and the ways that the continual changing nature of the Earth's structure sometimes result in devastating earthquakes, tsunamis and volcanic eruptions. With the help of Mr. Stone, one of our SOIS secondary science teachers, the Grade 4 class took part in investigations that helped them better understand the extreme movements of the Earth as well as some modern technology that helps people survive. In one recent investigation, the students were challenged to construct "earthquake-proof" structures using marshmallows, plastic straws and toothpicks. Working together in teams of 3 and 4, the Grade 4s planned and constructed tall and sturdy structures that could remain standing through a series of increased tremor intensity levels created by Mr. Stone's very own homemade "earthquake simulator" machine. Everyone had fun experimenting with the different wall brace designs and also trying to make the tallest and sturdiest structure.

In addition to this, the students have also begun a class action project in which they will take a critical look at our school's current safety protocols and materials in place for use during a school emergency. The students have already gone around to each elementary classroom and taken inventory of all yellow ESAKs (Emergency Survival Aid Kits) and are preparing their report for the teachers and administration of their observations and suggestions for improvement. In the upcoming weeks, the students will also be working on their own ideas for better ways to more effectively communicate emergency procedures to students, teachers and other members of our school community. This is really a wonderful opportunity for our students to help others while further broadening their understandings of how "human survival is connected to understanding the continual changing nature of the Earth's structures."





KG UPDATE

Coordination and cooperation agreement signed with nonprofit STAND - 16 December 2015

On December 15 at Tokyo's Sapia Tower, KGU signed a coordination and cooperation agreement with the nonprofit STAND (Representative Director: Kazuko Ito). This is STAND's first partnership with a university. (*STAND promotes the rights of mentally and physically disabled people.)

According to the agreement, KGU, whose school motto is "Mastery for Service," and STAND, which aims to build a society where all people can exercise their abilities to the fullest and gain pride and independence while living vigorously and in prosperity, will engage in mutual collaboration in the areas of para-sports promotion and human resource development. As projects under the agreement, the two parties will offer seminars and joint courses aimed at promoting para-sports and conduct training for para-sports liaisons and volunteers with the goal of contributing to society through the joint projects. On Saturday, April 23, a symposium commemorating the agreement signing will be held mainly for Kwansei Gakuin students (from the University, Junior and Senior High Schools, and Elementary School) at the Nishinomiya Uegahara Campus's Central Auditorium to promote greater understanding of para-sports.


At the signing ceremony, University President Osamu Murata said, "The spirit of volunteerism is deeply ingrained in Kwansei Gakuin University. We were one of the first universities in Japan to provide support for the disabled. Through collaboration with STAND, I would like us to develop educational programs, events, and a variety of other initiatives ahead of the Tokyo 2020 Paralympics that we can carry forward even beyond that date."

Nobutaka Murao, Professor to the Office of the President, commented, "When I observed the Paralympic Games in London, I was impressed by residents' enthusiasm and appreciation for para-sports. I hope the symposium next April will be the first of many efforts to boost para-sports in Kansai and other regions. Let's take this as a small step toward thinking about what kind of society we want to create."

Ura, KGU's first sumo wrestler, sets his sights on rising to the rank of juryo in the next tournament! -10 December 2015



On November 22, the final day of the Kyushu Basho Grand Sumo Tournament, former KGU Sumo Club member Ura (Stable: Kise; Real Name: Kazuki Ura, School of Education '15), who currently holds the West #54 rank in the makushita (third-highest) sumo division, advanced all the way to the division's championship round. After both had won all seven of their previous matches, Ura faced off against fellow Kise Stable wrestler Shiba in a tense three-minute bout that ended with Ura losing by a hair to Shiba's yoritaoshi technique (knocking an opponent over while holding his belt). Despite Ura's bitter defeat, it was a thrilling match that electrified the sumo fans gathered at the stadium.

Following his debut in the 2015 March tournament, Ura proceeded to climb up the rankings with multiple undefeated tournaments for a record of 7-0, 7-0, and 5-2, a strong showing for a makushita. In the next tournament, his sights are set on rising to the juryo (second-highest) division of salaried wrestlers.

Ura tells his fans, "Thanks to your support, even I'm surprised by how steadily I've been able to climb up the rankings. I'm currently working hard at building up my strength in preparation for the next tournament. I look forward to your support then as well."
